



## Police bosses seek to calm fears over police stations

■ **Consultant report suggests 'closures' ahead**  
■ **Police Authority says 'not in the foreseeable future'**

It was revealed in the Daily Post that police stations in Wirral could be under threat of closure if a new 'Area Command Centre' goes ahead.

The Area Command Centre would lead to an assessment of other 'access points' (stations) for closure, according to a report by the consultants to the Police.

Leah Fraser, prospective Conservative MP for Wallasey, reacted strongly against the idea that stations such as Manor Road could close: "Communities need more visible policing and that

means more police, on the streets, working from local stations.

"Merseyside Police has been struggling for years with a lack of money from the Government. Closing police stations must not be seen as the solution."

Now, the Police Authority has sought to calm fears that the new Area Command Centre will lead to closures.

At a meeting, attended by Leah, the Chairman of the Authority said there was no intention to close stations in Wirral in the 'foreseeable future'.

### Mersey Court: why demolish?

Plans have been announced to 'decommission' Mersey Court and Charter House. Conservatives have called for more consultation with residents and an investigation as to why the original estimates to refurbish the blocks was so inaccurate. **Meanwhile**, Labour wants to stop Councillors having a say in what happens to homes owned by Wirral Partnership Homes.

## 87% say Council neglect made Liscard Hall attack more likely

Local campaigner Leah Fraser said: "In spite of what the Council now says, Liscard Hall is a victim of their neglect."

## Liscard Hall: your views

**There was a big response to our survey on Liscard Hall. Here are some of the comments from people in Seacombe and Poulton on what they would like to see happen to the site now:**

"Something for youth and children because there is nothing for them in Wallasey." suggested Mrs H, Gorse Lane.

Mrs R in Hampstead Road asked "Why have we not got any park keepers?"

Security of the Park was also raised by Mr W in York Road: "Shut the Park at dusk, like it used to be."

Mr C in Norman Road felt strongly that the site should remain public.

Mrs B in St Paul's Road added: "Anything that does not make a profit for the Council. They never accepted any proposal in the past."

Mrs M in The Grove asks: "How come the building withstood bombs in the war and who gave permission for demolition?"

Mrs M in Silverbeech Road, overlooking the Park, would like to see a garden created as there is in Vale Park but adds: "Our current council couldn't organise a bus queue!"

Meanwhile, Mr R in Wheatland Lane, who didn't feel the Council's neglect contributed to the attack, says: "If a new building is erected, then a private security company should be brought in to prevent further vandalism."

# Drivers urge Eagle to rethink road tax hike

Four out of five drivers who have bought cars since 2001 will pay more tax.

Leah Fraser, who will be challenging the Labour MP at the next election, said: "This tax rise is not a 'green tax'; Angela's plans will see tax for many cars double overnight with no effect on carbon emissions at all."
